Quality Assurance

QA: What do we know



- The pandemic has had a complex impact on demand for services across area and known risks to children
- Additional assurance from agencies about how children have been "seen" during lockdown
- In extremely challenging times, everyone has been working very hard to keep children safe and there has been really good evidence of partners working effectively

QA: What are we doing



- Continue to gain assurance regarding safeguarding arrangements / processes
 - Assurance of outreach during lockdown and contingency plans
- Sharing of audit activity / findings
- Monthly reporting / meetings put in place to monitor impact of coronavirus on children
- Putting in place: QA Strategy and QA Matrix
- Briefing documents regarding available support and intervention available

QA: Future developments



- Continue to identify critical areas /themes/ trends where the safety of children is being affected by coronavirus
- To evidence recommendations from case reviews are leading to improved practice/ service change
- Working to improve our work with vulnerable pregnant women and babies
- Finalise joint QA Performance reporting;
 Strategy; Matrix

Reviews: What do we know



- Since September 2019 a total of 7 rapid reviews have been conducted
- Looked at themes from 24 reviews since 2015
 - 13 cases involving babies
 - 1 preschool child
 - 10 school age children

"Critically, through systematic review, we can build a picture of child protection practice more generally, highlighting repeat practice themes and focus on what needs to change." National CSPR Panel

Reviews: What are we doing



- Driving forward the completion of reviews Put in place thematic learning
- Learning from practitioners, manager and organisations key to systemic improvement
- Keeping babies safe will be a key strategic challenge for our partnership
- Linking learning with updating training and audit programme

Reviews: Future developments



- Influence key areas for practice assurance and development including:
 - Work with the Keeping Babies Safe Strategic
 Group
 - Strengthen how school age children are supported
- Implement key guidance such as Working with Intrafamilial Child Sexual Abuse
- Keep you up to date with updated and new courses and circulate briefings

Education: What do we know



- Children and young people's lived experience has been profoundly changed since lockdown
- Schools and colleges continue to adapt to make sure they remain the safety net for pupils and promote resilience
- Significant rises in emotional difficulties and mental ill health
- The central role of schools in the safeguarding system is unequivocal

Education: What are we doing



- Sharing and promoting a wide range of resources
- Promoting key developments:
 - i-Vengers (Online safety); Cyber Choices;
 Resources into Schools group (Contextual Safeguarding) and others
- Stopping Domestic Abuse Together review
- Sharing and promoting good practice across the sector in response to the pandemic

Education: Future developments



- Develop the Resources into Schools group
- Scrutinise across our area the increase of Elective Home Education
- Work across the partnership to promote access to timely early support including emotional welfare
- Strengthen effectiveness of the use of technologies that help schools participate



Exploited and Vulnerable Young People (EVYP)

EVYP: What do we know



- The pandemic has increased serious levels of stress and anxiety for young people
- Young people are helping us to understand that they need:
 - A greater understanding of the criminal exploitation
 - What happens when concerns about domestic abuse are reported
 - Easy access to services for emotional wellbeing

EVYP: What are we doing



- Increasing the involvement of young people
- Closely monitoring emerging trends leading to exploitation and vulnerability
- Beginning to join up how agencies respond to criminal exploitation and contextual safeguarding
- Providing guidance on domestic abuse and the impact of the pandemic along with new E-Learning

EVYP: Future developments



- Establishing a participation strategy to support change driven by young people
- Establishing a clearer strategic approach to dealing with criminal exploitation and contextual safeguarding
- Strengthen support for children who are missing

Districts: What do we know



- The Derbyshire Districts Safeguarding Leads Group (developed Sept 2017) to strengthen the link between the boards and the Districts and Boroughs.
- There is the opportunity to capture concerns and information from the sheer volume of community transactions in the Districts
- Significant pressures during the pandemic on families and an increase in domestic abuse and pressures on homelessness

Districts: What are we doing



- There is a more 'joined up' approach to safeguarding across Districts and Boroughs
- Continue to act as a forum to
 - Implementing learning from reviews
 - Promoting briefings, training and development
 - Share best practice
- Acting as an effective conduit between the Boards and the Districts and Boroughs.

Districts: Future developments



- Use findings from safeguarding assurance of individual districts to establish a programme of shared development across the area
- Ensuring response completed to the S11 Audit
- Maximise training opportunities currently being finalised – webinars, e learning, learning pod
- Support staff through the current COVID crisis
- Develop the DSG workplan

Policies and Procedures: What do we know



- The pandemic has required urgent amendment to key documents and guidance
- Learning from practice and case reviews has been crucial in developing our local policies and procedures
- Case reviews are highlighting the effectiveness and support for your practice when policies / procedures and guidance are used

Policies and Procedures: What are we doing



- Working with both hospitals to review whether local guidance is effective in identifying harm to babies
- Exploring in case reviews with Practitioner and Managers what will help improve practice
- Looking to improve the guidance that is in place from what you are telling us. For example: escalation processes

Policies and Procedures: Future developments



- Guidance developed following reviews such as Dangerous dogs
- Implement new guidance on Working with Intrafamilial Child Sexual Abuse
- Challenging ourselves across the partnership –
 Are we using the policies / procedures / guidance, and can we see impact?

L & OD: What do we know



- Significant demand for training
- Flexibility and responsiveness needed to support our workforce is embedded in
 - DDSCP Training Programme
 - DDSCP Multi-Agency Training Pathways
 - DDSCP Training Strategy
- Learning and development is crucial for our workforce to keep children safe.

L & OD: What are we doing



- New online learning platform "Phew!" 2659 delegates registered since July
- Online "face to face" courses in place
 - Working Together: Everyone's Responsibility
 - Domestic Abuse: Impact on the Child
 - Graded Care Profile (Neglect)
 - Managing Allegations
- E Learning courses in place include
 - Introduction to Safeguarding: Keeping Children
 Safe

L & OD: Future developments



- Virtual delivery of courses
 - Child Sexual Abuse; Hidden Men; Effective
 Support and Supervision
- E Learning courses
 - Keeping Babies Safe; Domestic Abuse
 (Assessments); Alcohol and Substance Abuse;
 Local Safeguarding Arrangements: An Introduction
- Briefings linked to case reviews and local audit
